



Editor's Choice

My photographic journey – Anne Hrabar

Photography was alive and well in our house when I was a child. My mom took stills as inspiration for her landscape paintings and Dad was always taking movies on holiday and special occasions. My first camera was, I think, a box brownie. You looked in from the top! As soon as I earned a meagre salary during my prac year during Architectural studies I bought a Pentax Spotmatic SLR as did Andrew my then fiancé. We spent many happy times shooting at the Rand Easter show and even walking and shooting the streets of downtown Jhb on Saturday nights! We joined the Wits photo club to be able to use the darkroom, so I did a little printing. I took, developed, and printed my first selfie at age 20! Just wish I could find it now.

Continued studies resulted in the camera only being brought out for holiday trips and high days. Slides were the preferred medium by then. This continued through the stage of babies, kids' parties etc.

My camera still got to be used for work. Images of foundations, structural steel in place before a pour, plumbing pipes and electrical conduit were the order of the day.

We changed to digital in 2004. However, post processing did not even cross my mind! I shot in auto mode using my Nikon D100 as a point and shoot. Salons, salons.....SALONS!!!

This is a subject that gives most people Goosebumps – either of the good or bad kind! So many enter salons, and they are so excited about their entries, that they sit at the edge of their chairs awaiting the results. When the results come out, it is just there when most people's enthusiasm comes to a screeching halt!! Out of 24 images, you have 1 or 2 acceptances, sometimes if you are fortunate. What is more likely to happen, is that you get 0 acceptances. Oh dear, really **ABSOLUTELY NO ACCEPTANCES????** People get discouraged and feel negative about salons and together with the fact that they stop entering, they do not have a good word to say about salons either...but that is ok. Let's try and explain something about salons, if it is at all possible, as salons are, just like anything in photography, a very subjective thing. I have had this discussion with a lot of people and it can go on and on! I would like to keep this short and sweet – like I always say, less is more!!

Remember the following: Club judging is all about the learning experience. A salon is like a test and Honours judging is like an examination. Let me explain how salon judging works. People all over the country have the opportunity to enter the salon and you can end up with many hundreds of entries. Salon judging is not about taking your time - this is a point where people like to criticize salons a lot - but salon images are usually all about IMPACT!. The different image, the one that does not look like 400 of the other entries, a unique image that STANDS OUT!! Usually it is people with judging experience that judge a salon, people that can within seconds identify a good image out of all the images entered. You have to come to a point where you can accept that those judges might just have a sound reason for not accepting your image based on a lot of exposure and experience. Something else to remember is the number of acceptances allowed per salon. The general rule is only between 20-25% of entries will be accepted and out of that, 10% of the acceptances will receive a COM. The final decision on the exact percentage of acceptances lies with the hosting club. Let's talk numbers.....

Let's say one category received 1000 entries. For this we are going to follow the worst case scenario. 20% of 1000 is 200. Only 200 images out of the 1000 will be accepted and then 10% of 200 bring the number of COMs to 20. I really hope this gives you a little bit of perspective on the numbers. Let's say you have a low entry salon and the number of entries is only 500. 20% of 500 is only 100 and 10% for COMs is only 10 images. Now you can see that salons are a numbers game. The more entries, the better your chance of getting images accepted, but then you are also competing against a bigger pool of entries. This is something that you do not have control over. It is just the way it is – unfortunately!!

The judging procedure is as follows. You as a judge sit in a dark room with a calibrated projector. You and the other 2 judges sit down and the images are displayed. You have a scoring device like we have at the club to give your score out of 15. This is basically the "In" vs "Out" round, the first sifting of the entries. After this and breaks in between, you come back to look at the numbers. Sometimes there are way too many images that were accepted and then you have to redo scoring for, say the 36 scoring group, to once again have a sifting. The top scoring images (37 and up) are those that are in the running for COMs and the medals. You once again look through all those top scoring images, discussing the images that you as a judging panel feel deserve the 1st and 2nd place. This could take some time if the 3 judges are not on the same page. If there are still too many COMs you have to look through those again and then choose the 20 best to receive COMs. It is a time consuming process and we as judges have the sense of responsibility to choose the best images. Because of the fact that there are 3 judges, one person's personal preference will be eliminated, since the process is balanced.

Some personal pointers from Alta:

- 1. Enter salons to impress NOBODY but yourself. If you are in a rat race with someone else, you are playing a dangerous game. Enter salons to compete with yourself, nobody else.
- 2. It took me YEARS to get over the 1 image acceptance norm. My advice keep on swimming!! It has a lot to do with your personality and there is no right or wrong here. To me it is a challenge. I take every salon as it comes, the acceptances as well as the lack thereof. I am thankful for the acceptances I do get and set a small goal for the next one. Always set very small goals. Try and get at least 1 acceptance for 3 salons in a row, then you try for 2! It is all about moving forward, baby steps are just the way to go!!
- 3. Try to enter a high impact image. What is a high impact image? What you view as high impact might not be high impact for me, but I think that generally we all know a high impact image when we see it. When you choose your images, try to detach yourself emotionally from your image. Most often we choose images that we have a huge emotional connection with, but it is not necessarily a high impact image. The judges will not share your emotional attachment, are totally unaware of either the effort it took to take the image, of how you felt when you took it. Therefore, try and evaluate your image on a non-emotional level
- 4. The club score for an image is not always a good guide of how it will perform on salons. Salon acceptances are not as easily available as gold awards at the club. Use your club score as an indication, but NEVER be upset if you received a high score in the club and your image is not accepted in a salon. Due to the numbers, there might have been better images than yours. Not because your image is not good, but because it might just fall short!!
- 5. Do not enter images taken on outings directly after the outing has taken place. So many times, I have seen 100s of images of the same "outing" in a particular salon. Judges get extremely bored looking at images from the same outing and they, therefore, lose their impact even if by themselves they are good. Once again, you do not want to enter the same type of images that other people will enter, then your image will just not have impact. Wait for 3 months at least before you enter your image....then your image will be fresh and different!!
- 6. Never forget why we do photography. We do it because we love it. Chasing acceptances and awards is not always the best way to approach your photography. See every acceptance/award as a bonus. Have your focus on improving your skills technical and artistic.
- 7. Never give up!! If you want to be successful in a salon, never give up after only a few unsuccessful attempts. Remember, because of the subjective input by the judges, you might get one image accepted in one salon and not in the next one.
- 8. Never become too serious!! Always keep your sense of humour. "Oh dear, this was one of those terrible salons, I will try again" or "WONDERFUL, this was a great salon for me!!" If you are too serious and get anxious and furious with the judges you will only make yourself unhappy. Salons are there for you to measure your skills, use it to improve your skills.
- 9. Be careful of Facebook likes. I've seen so many people fall into this trap. They are "Facebook Photographers", chasing likes and comments. The main question is, who is commenting and who likes your images? It is your friends, who love and adore you, but most of the time, they know NOTHING about photography! "WOW, this is an amazing image!" Usually, these comments are on images that are underexposed and out of focus. Just because you get likes and positive Facebook comments, do not

make it a good image. Keep perspective and be rational. Your Facebook "judges" are your friends, they see the person behind the image and will therefore comment in an uplifting manner. Salon judges are experienced people who know what to look for. They do not know who the author is; they simply judge the quality of the image itself!

10. Salons are like a game. The rules of the game are not always well defined, and the outcome may not always be fair in your mind!! That is the name of the game!! Play the game and make the best of it. If playing this game is giving you more heartache than pleasure, rather not play at all. Just remember you cannot argue with someone about what is pretty or tasty, as beauty lies in the eyes of the beholder. Some like tomato sauce over their chips some hate it, but it does not make the use of tomato sauce wrong!! If you decide not to play the game, it is also ok. Do not fall in the trap to break salons down because it's not working for you. If you are willing to play the game, do it with good sportsmanship and have the attitude of everything you get is only a BONUS!!
